What is ASP?

The Appalachia Service Project (ASP) was founded in 1969 with the mission of making homes warmer, safer, and drier for families living in this region of the country and providing transformational service experiences for volunteers. In order to do this, ASP volunteers help repair roofs, walls, floors, foundations, and bathrooms, in addition to making homes accessible through porch and ramp repairs or additions. More than 15,000 volunteers serve with ASP each year, serving more than 25 communities and 350 families.

We are excited to lead this adventure and hope to take 35 youth and 15 adult volunteers with us this year on our 25th trip as a congregation!

Why volunteer with ASP?

This mission trip fundamentally lets us put our Christian and Methodist traditions in action. So much of this trip involves *fundamentals* of these traditions...e.g., love God, love your neighbor as yourself and John Wesley's challenge to live this relationship by performing acts of piety (worship/study) and acts of mercy and justice. ASP is "walking the walk" of these. It gets us out of our comfort zone and our daily routines, levels the playing field for all, and challenges us to form community, learning about our differences, our similarities, with a focus on accomplishing ASP's mission set forth for us.
